### **Weld County Tornado Relief**

**The Weld Food Bank has been depleted due to the emergency assistance it has provided to folks as a result of the recent tornado and related devastation. The WCBA is sponsoring a drive, right now, to benefit the Weld Food Bank. Our goal is to raise as much money as possible, as quickly as possible, to enable the Food Bank to continue its work. Send your donation directly to the Food Bank, 1108 H Street, Greeley, CO 80631. Or get your donation to any member of the Board of Directors and they will take care of conveying it to the Food Bank.**

**Cash is absolutely needed.** For every cash dollar received, the Food Bank can leverage it to be able to distribute \$10 worth of food. That way, they can buy exactly what they need. *(Note: IF anyone writes a check for more than \$100, there is an economic development state tax credit available. IF you wish to take advantage of that, please make check out to: Weld Food Bank/EDEZ and include either your social security number or CO tax ID # on the memo line of check. EDEZ will send paperwork for a 25% credit on next year's taxes!)*

Some people prefer to purchase the actual food they wish to donate, and that is welcome. However, to expedite delivery of that food, they ask that people purchase [cases of food](#) instead of emptying their shelves. When the Food Bank receives individual items, they have to go through a somewhat lengthy safety check – expiration dates, labels, dents, bulging cans, and then check against 5 years worth of food recalls! When they receive a sealed or boxed case of food, they can deliver that food as is because they can be relatively certain where the food has come from. It greatly expedites the process.

**As far as the types of food, there are priority foods (although they will take whatever people wish to donate). Priority non-perishable foods include canned meats, beef stews and chilis, canned fruits, and peanut butter as well as cereal. Pastas are especially helpful as well. They are also continuously in need of snack bars (like granola bars, protein bars, etc.) and canned**

**juices as they are distributing ongoing supplies to tornado recovery teams.**

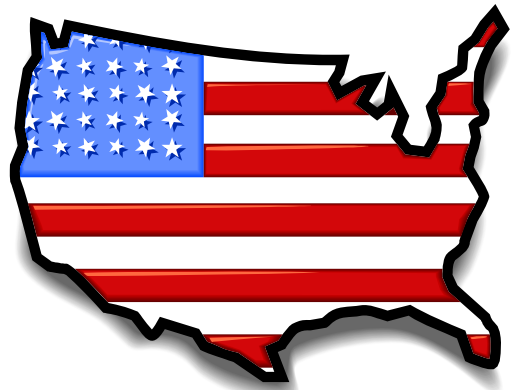

## Great Grills



### Grilled Banana Splits

- 12 large firm-ripe bananas, skins washed thoroughly to remove residue
- 3 bars (4 oz. each) milk or dark chocolate, broken into small pieces
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 3 pints of your favorite ice cream
- 3 cups whipped cream
- 3/4 cup chopped toasted walnuts (optional)
- 12 maraschino cherries (optional)

Prepare gas or charcoal grill for direct, medium-high heat (you can hold your hand 1 to 2 inches above cooking grate only 2-3 seconds).

While grill heats, cut into each unpeeled banana lengthwise, making a deep slip but taking care to avoid cutting all the way through. Slip pieces of chocolate into each pocket and sprinkle with cinnamon. Wrap each banana in foil.

Lay bananas on cooking grate; cover gas grill. Cook, turning once, until soft when squeezed with tongs, about 10 minutes. Lift bananas onto a platter.

Carefully unwrap each banana and place on a plate with the cut side facing up. top each with small scoops of ice cream; add a dollop of whipped cream, a sprinkling of walnuts, and a cherry, if you like.

The government may not search or take a person's property without a warrant.  
A person may not be tried twice for the same crime and does not have to testify against him/herself.  
A person charged with a crime still has some rights, such as the right to a trial and to have a lawyer.  
The right to trial by jury in most cases.  
Protects people against excessive or unreasonable fines or cruel and unusual punishment.  
The people have rights other than those mentioned in the Constitution.  
Any power not given to the federal government by the Constitution is a power of either the state or the people.
